Kitten Supply List

This list can make your kitten's transition into your home a smoother, happier experience.

- Cat carrier large enough to accommodate kitty when she is grown up.
- Cat bed even a card board box with a towel will do to start off. You will know what kitty likes as she gets older.
- Food and water dishes pottery, ceramic and metal are much better than plastic, as they are less likely to harbor bacteria when cleaned well. They should be sturdy and not easily knocked over.
- Food EASEL recommends Grain free food, especially for young kittens. Their digestive systems often are not ready for grains, leading to diarrhea and complications due to dehydration as a result. Kittens should have a small amount of wet food (1-2 tablespoons) at least once every day, and free access to dry food all the time. As they get older your vet will help recommend a feeding schedule to ensure a proper adult weight for the cat's size.
- A BREAKAWAY collar and tag your kitten should wear them whenever he leaves the house, even if he is inside a cat carrier.
- Toys! be careful about strings and other objects a kitten could swallow. Think smart, don't leave toys around that can be dangerous! Kitten proof the house, like you would for a baby.
- Book(s) on cat healthcare

- Grooming supplies at least one brush and nail clippers. The type will vary with the breed of cat.
- Litter box and scoop (See also EASEL Tips for Litter Boxes)
 - It is best to avoid clumping cat litter with kittens. You can change this when the kitten is older, about 12-16 weeks old.
 - Litter trays come in all shapes and sizes such as self cleaning, covered (or hooded), un-covered. Kittens should have a small box that is easy for them to get in and out of. The litter box must be bigger for adult cats.
 - Covered litter boxes should be avoided with shy kittens, as they tend to use them to hide, and that may interfere with the use for soiling. Provide a cardboard box or covered bed for the kitten to sleep and hide in. If you desire to try a covered litter box, you should leave it uncovered for small kittens and add the cover as the kitten gets older.
- Healthcare supplies including ear cleaner, cat toothbrush and toothpaste.
- Scratching post cats have a need to scratch and enjoy scratching. Providing your cat with it's own scratching post will reduce the chances of your cat using your furniture or carpet.
